Articles should preferably be less than 8,000 words, but longer articles may be submitted. Brief abstracts are required, to accompany the submission.

It is essential that submissions follow the style format employed in the most recent issues of the journal. This is especially the case with references and notes. Articles that do not approximate this style will be returned for resubmission.

While we recognise that some references (such as to archival material) are more appropriately located in the note format, these are to be seen as exceptions. Copies that do not approximate the style requirements will be returned to authors for resubmission.
