- **Manuel Dieterich** is a sociologist doing his PhD at the Collaborative Research Centre 923 ‘Threatened Orders’ at the University of Tübingen. In his research project he examines the interplay of threats, moralisations and neighbourhood relations in the West Rand of Johannesburg.
